### THE HEALTHCARE SECTOR IN THE SOUTH

### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

### INTRODUCTION

It was official on June 13, 2007. The crash of the United States economy had begun - falling stock prices, a slump in home sales and rising unemployment. To add to the impending burden on this country was the fact that Baby Boomers were leaving the labor market with no plans to return, and increasing needs for healthcare reform and a greater development of technology in order to remain globally competitive. Yes, the current future of this country was bleak as there were no comforting projections of how long this crashed economy would last or even begin to recover.

On February 17, 2009, President Barack Obama signed the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (The Act). The primary object for The Act was to save and create jobs almost immediately. The secondary objectives were to provide temporary relief programs for those most impacted by the recession and invest in infrastructure, education, health, and "green" energy, of which the Act intended direct spending. Furthermore, The Act expanded unemployment benefits and other social welfare provisions.

The country's state of affairs was a call for every operating entity with the responsibility to serve the public to reconsider its current practices and missions. The country's economy affected every U.S. resident and visitor. Every state was feeling the effects of the great recession.

### BACKGROUND

Nevada was not immune. All of the State's major sector industries were being hit, and being hit hard. We were number one in housing foreclosures, unemployment, and lowest graduation rates. Nevada's number one source of private funds was struggling as the lack of money meant fewer visitors and fewer dollars toward the hospitality market. The balance to this ugly monster was low-skilled healthcare workers in an economy that needed a greater-skilled base healthcare worker. In other words, the emerging market of healthcare was faced with workers who were unable to meet the needs of the healthcare profession, particularly in nursing. This meant that Nevada's list of considerations for economic recovery had to include a means to produce higher-skilled healthcare professionals so they could become employed.

### WORKFORCE CONNECTIONS RESPONDS

The Act padded budgets of agencies' (i.e., Dept. of Labor (DOL), Dept. of Education (DOE). Health and Human Services (HHS), etc.) with additional funds, more commonly referred to as Stimulus Funds, DOL was budgeted with the funds that were meant to assist individuals back into the labor market while attempting to reduce the pace of those entering onto the unemployment rolls. The funds to help these individuals would reach the states with the intent of getting to them by Local Workforce Investment Boards (LWIB). In Nevada that meant NevadaWorks in the north, and workforce CONNECTIONS (wC) (formerly Southern Nevada Workforce Investment Board) in the south.

Just as all of this was happening, Nevada was initiating the development of two of the sector industries that were cited in The Act – healthcare and "green" economy. The greatest healthcare sector drive in the State, however, was occurring within the ranks of the southern Workforce Investment Board, workforce CONNECTIONS.

In the first year, the framework included the establishment of partnerships with major healthcare institutions and professionals that eventually led to partnerships with the Southern Nevada Medical Industry Coalition (SNMIC). Within the second year of the healthcare sector development, wC was able to obtain Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) funds to continue to develop the healthcare sector. Subsequently, wC began to direct more fiscal resources to the development of the healthcare sector that included awarding funds to agencies that served adults and dislocated workers, such as Foundation for an Independent Tomorrow (FIT), Nevada Hospital Association (NHA), Southern Nevada Regional Housing Authority (SNRHA), Clark County School District-Desert Rose (CCSD-DR), Nevada Partners, Inc. (NPI), and Las Vegas Latin Chamber of Commerce (LVLCC). Together –wC and these funded partners - collaborated to provide adult services, such as training and job placement, to those who were seeking employment in the field of healthcare.

The planning and coordination meant that the funded partners would determine and focus on specific segments of the healthcare industry, i.e., nursing, phlebotomy, medical assisting, dentistry, pharmacy, etc. as not to duplicate efforts and to attempt to affect the healthcare industry with a broader, more deliberate approach.

### THE CHALLENGES

Since these activities were unchartered for *workforce* **CONNECTIONS**, funded partners were directed to document their challenges and triumphs. Collectively, it was determined that trainings in the healthcare sector industry were more costly and longer than was traditionally encountered with other industry trainings. Additionally, this meant that greater calculations would require re-consideration as the longer trainings meant a more delayed job placement for those in training, which means greater planning around meeting performance measurements. Summarily, the funded partners experienced challenges, such as:

- The more in-demand positions, i.e., registered nursing, radiology, medical assisting, and physical therapy, were the most costly and require lengthier training
- Healthcare professions require cleaner backgrounds
- The adult vs. dislocated worker split was becoming more difficult to meet as the economy improved
- More OJTs were necessary to ascertain and secure employment for those interested in obtaining employment in the healthcare industry, thus more costly job placements
- Greater soft skills are necessary to obtain employment unlike other industries, i.e., computer skills, and
- The lack of previous-related healthcare experience, i.e., at least 2 years.

### PLANNING THE FUTURE

While workforce CONNECTIONS is certainly faced with these challenges, it is not enough to abate the work in further developing the healthcare sector. However, the staff must decide to what extent resources should be allocated to the field. True, participants typically earn more money. Nevertheless, this means having fewer impacts on the members within the community, i.e., I family or 2 becoming self-sufficient because of wC's intervention and a longer period of time before a positive return of investment can be realized.

Secondly, a consideration has to be given to how contracts will be established, wC's contractual obligations are based on the amount of DOL funds it receives. Multiple year contracts are nice, however, a drop in funding could threaten performance and future funding and DOL. State and private (healthcare) relationships, future funding, and DOL.
